Message from the Executive Director

81 years ago today, the devastating attack on Pearl Harbor killed 2,403 Americans and set the stage for American entry into World War II – a war in which an allied victory helped preserve democracy and fundamental freedoms for not just the United States, but the world.

Just one day prior, on December 6, many Americans, including Senator Arthur Vandenberg (R-MI), believed in American isolationism and feared engagement in the war then taking over Europe would only undermine American security. And yet, as bombs rained down on the United States, Senator Vandenberg and many of his colleagues understood the world had changed. In his words, "My convictions regarding international cooperation and collective security for peace took firm form on the afternoon of the Pearl Harbor attack. That day ended isolationism for any realist."

The Vandenberg Coalition is proud to carry on this mantle as we face a similar rise in retreat-based thinking.
